





#### **UPCOMING EVENTS**

#### **VILLAGE ORGANISATIONS**

There are several organisations in the village with differing responsibilities. These organisations include:

- Village Hall Committee
- Friends of Belchamp Walter Church (covered in e-news #13)
- Parochial Church Council (please see below)
- Parish Council.

Some people might not understand the roles, responsibilities and aims of these organisations, so this enews, and future e-news, will provide some background on each of these organisations, what their aims are and their membership. This e-news covers the Parochial Church Council.

#### Parochial Church Council

The **Parochial Church Council (PCC)** plays a crucial role in the administration and governance of a parish within the Church of England. The PCC is a charitable organization and members of the PCC serve as trustees of the charity.

The membership of PCC is set at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. The current PCC membership is as follows:

Rev Gill Morgan (chair), Monika Shepherd (churchwarden), Helen Krelle (secretary), David Gerrard, Polly Gerrard, Martin Runnacles, Lou Scott, Pete Scott. Jan Munro is treasurer to the PCC but is not a member of the PCC.

The main roles and responsibilities of the PCC include:

- 1. Spiritual and Mission Leadership: Supporting the clergy in promoting the mission of the church within the community.
- 2. Financial Oversight: Managing the church's finances, including budgeting, fundraising, and ensuring proper accounting practices.
- 3. Property Management: Maintaining church buildings and ground, ensuring they are safe and suitable for worship and community activities.
- 4. Safeguarding: Implementing policies to protect children and vulnerable adults within the church community.
- 5. Community Engagement: Facilitating communication between the church and the wider community, promoting the church's activities, and fostering community relationships.

Finances are a challenge for the PCC. People tend to think that the Church of England is rich but they don't, necessarily, understand the finances of St Mary's. It costs just over £200 a week to keep the church open, and this is just running costs, it does not include any repairs and maintenance. The largest expense for the church is the parish share, which is the money that each parish share contributes to the diocese. In addition to diocese costs it covers the cost of clergy salaries, pensions, housing, training and support. In 2024, Belchamp Walter has been asked to pay £7,800 for parish share. The second largest expense is insurance which will likely be very close to £2,000 when it is renewed in a few months.

Maintaining the grade 1 listed church building is also a very expensive business. You may recall from enews #5 that the wall paintings were cleaned and surveyed last year at a cost of £2,200. The majority of this cost was covered through grants. The same e-news reported that work would start on the roof and porch in November. That work, unfortunately was delayed and is now scheduled for July. The work was re-quoted and, like most things, has gone up and not down. The cost of these repairs will be almost £19,000 plus VAT (which the church can claim back). Thanks to the diligent work of our church warden, Monika, a substantial amount of this cost will be met through grant funding (£13,800), The Friends of Belchamp Walter Church have pledged £4,000 and the remainder of the money will be paid by the PCC.

The result of the wall painting survey was that the C14th paintings had survived in remarkable condition. Additional work, however, was recommended to ensure the paintings are conserved in the long term. This work is costly £10,860 plus VAT. Work has started on gaining the necessary permissions. Work on the church often requires a "faculty" from the diocese. This is somewhat like planning permission and ensures that any changes are in keeping with the historical, architectural and liturgical significance of the church. The application for the wall paintings had to be approved by the Diocese Advisory Council and then had to go to the Consistory Court to grant a faculty. All this takes a lot of volunteer time and needs to be complete before the real work of applying for grants can take place. The process takes a long time because many grant funding bodies only accept applications once or twice a year, Unfortunately as time passes the quotes for the work expire and subsequent quotes are higher.


